### Title Sponsor - Brevard C.A.R.E.S.

**Brevard C.A.R.E.S.** is the signature child welfare prevention and diversion program in Brevard County Florida designed in 2005 as a new level of care on the child welfare continuum by Dr. Patricia Nellius, and implemented by Valerie Holmes and Tracy Little. Since inception, the Brevard **C.A.R.E.S.** program has served over 15,000 children diverting them from entry into the child welfare, juvenile justice and mental health systems while safely maintaining children at home, in their community and local schools.

Brevard C.A.R.E.S., (an acronym for Coordination, Advocacy, Resources, Education, and Support), is a community-based, front end prevention and diversion program utilizing Wraparound Family Team Conferencing to successfully engage, divert and serve families at risk of entry into the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

C.A.R.E.S. mission is to "Protect Children, Strengthen Families and Change Lives, Whatever it Takes!" C.A.R.E.S. builds upon families' strengths using Wraparound to prevent entry into the formal child welfare and/or juvenile justice system. C.A.R.E.S. engages the youth and family, identifies strengths and needs, convenes customized Family Team Meetings inclusive of natural and community supports, and creates an individualized and well-coordinated plan of care to strengthen the family and reduce the likelihood of abuse and neglect while achieving measurable goals and positive outcomes that result in family stabilization and preservation.

Through rigorous evaluation the **C.A.R.E.S.** outcomes have been validated in a published study conducted by Munoz, A.S., Renteria, R.M., Gelwicks, J., & Fasano, M., (2015) Reducing Risk: Families in Wraparound Intervention, Families In Society, The Journal of Contemporary Social Services, 96(2), 91-98 and is now available for National Replication.

The **C.A.R.E.S.** program is proven to reduce the number of children entering the child welfare system. **C.A.R.E.S.** costs on average \$550 per month as compared to \$2,500 per month to serve a child in the formal child welfare system and has better outcomes and less recidivism.





### **KEYNOTE SPEAKERS**

DEREK CLARK Inspiring Motivational Speaker The Power of Determination

Derek Clark's life is one of resilience and redemption. As a child he suffered unthinkable child abuse, abandonment and

emotional distress before being turned over to the psychiatric hospital at age five. His 13 years in the San Francisco bay area foster care system reflected an early life of humiliation, aggression, emotional distress, overwhelming anxiety and being wrongfully labeled.

Psychiatric reports stated that at the age of five years old, Derek had severe behavioral problems. Neurological reports stated that at six years old, he had the IQ of a two year old and diagnosed him with erratic psychosis. Having also been misdiagnosed as mentally handicapped and having numerous emotional and language difficulties, Derek never gave up.

With amazing help from his foster parents, a great social worker and mentors, he has defied the artificial limitations imposed upon him. Derek knows firsthand how to cope with adversity and overcoming hardship. His past has never held him back from accomplishing what he set his heart and mind to. From owning a very successful corporation to having a family, his maxim is to make no excuses.

Derek is an inspiring speaker and trainer and has been featured on Headline News, The Steve Harvey TV Show, The Ricki Lake Show and other shows around the world. He has recently become a viral video sensation with his "Rapping Dad" videos which have had millions of views and have been featured on Best of Instagram and Vine. He is the author of six books including "Never Limit Your Life," "Disable the Label," and the "I Will Never Give Up" book series.

As a speaker, author and singer/songwriter, Derek has spoken and performed his music from Australia to Canada including a President of the United States. His true-life trials and personal triumphs have inspired organizations with his message of hope and unwavering perseverance.

He has turned his situation from a victim to a victor, equipping him with the wisdom and the will to never give up.

Dr. VanDenBerg has lectured in every US state and almost all areas of Canada, in Europe and Asia. He developed the first demonstration of cross-agency



state-wide Wraparound process; the Alaska Youth Initiative. This was one of the first national efforts focused on services integration for children and families with complex needs. He has been a major innovator and pioneer in the gradual perfecting of the Wraparound process, which now reaches over a half million families worldwide. He delivered over 4000 on-site training and consultation days in communities across North America and other parts of the world. He has been honored with many national and international awards and recognitions for his ground-breaking work to improve the field of human services.

Dr. VanDenBerg has consulted with the federal government, state and local departments of child welfare, juvenile justice, mental health, education, including special education, adult corrections, and developmental disabilities, as well as with private foundations and private agencies around the U.S. and Canada. He is internationally recognized as a leading authority on innovative integrative services applications, and on Systems of Care and Wraparound process development for persons with complex needs and their families.

### JOHN FRANZ Owner, *Paper Boat Consulting*

John has taught in regular and special education classrooms, written legislation and administrative rules in the areas



of juvenile justice, child welfare and mental health, prosecuted and defended child welfare and juvenile justice cases, been a plaintiff's attorney in civil rights actions, advocated for adults with mental health and developmental disabilities, represented children and their parents in special education appeals, and coordinated Guardian ad Litem and permanency plan review services in the child welfare system. For the past 25 years he has partnered with agencies in communities around the country in their efforts to find better ways of assisting families and children with complex needs. Her workshops are action based combining the clinical with the concrete with systematic strategies and practical applications to enhance participant's work.

Karen received her Clinical Psychology degree from the University of the Witwatersrand, South Africa and her Doctoral degree in Education from Nova Southeastern University in Florida. Her research interests have been in the area of resilience in children exposed to violence and the building of Wraparound networks for children with complex needs. She is currently the Deputy Superintendent of Student Services in the Public Schools of Brookline.

DR. PATRICIA NELLIUS CEO, Brevard Family Partnership and The National Center for Innovation & Excellence

Patricia Nellius is the founding CEO of Brevard Family Partnership (BFP) where she has served since its inception in 2004.

Patricia holds a Masters and Doctorate in Counseling and recently completed the Multisystem Integration Certificate program at Georgetown University. Under Patricia's leadership Brevard successfully transformed its local child welfare system into a national model recognized for its innovations, excellence and positive outcomes. In addition to her role at Brevard Family Partnership, Patricia now serves as the CEO of the National Center for Innovation & Excellence.

Out of a deep desire to impact change and improve the quality of life for vulnerable children and families, Patricia worked her way from the field up to administration. She has served in the human service sector with specific focus on system reform for over 25 years. Patricia is a passionate, civic minded advocate who has served on a numerous local, state, and national Boards. Her service includes but is not limited to: The Center for the Study of Social Policy's National Youth Thrive Steering Committee; the Central Florida Cares Health System Board of Directors; the Florida Coalition for Children Board of Directors: Promise in Brevard Board of Directors; Governor Crist's Child Abuse Prevention and Permanency Advisory Council; and co-chair of Governor Crist's Faith Based Initiative.

Patricia's commitment to protect the vulnerable has resulted in many accolades for her efforts. 

Tracy has been involved in human services for many years and truly exemplifies family-centered, youth-driven care values. Tracy will stop at nothing to impart hope to those he encounters. Recognized nationally for his work in the area of youth advocacy, Tracy has provided training for the National Wraparound Initiative in the area of Initial Family Engagement, and the role of the Family Partner. He holds a Master of Business Administration and has 20 years experience in the fields of child welfare and mental health. He also serves as a National Consultant and Trainer in family strengthening models.

# Missing Frames - Life after Wraparound (Part 1) Constance Burgess

C. Burgess Consulting & Associates, LLC. St. Lucia Room

This workshop is dynamic and highly interactive and will demonstrate the basics of Wraparound in crisis planning. Participants will explore a simulated crisis situation; a time of intense difficulty, trouble or danger. Crisis includes a time when a difficult or important decision must be made. Participants will examine a video to inform the development of a crisis plan using the values and principles of Wraparound. We do not have all of the information, yet life for the youth and family/caregiver should be manageable and predictable after being introduced to Wraparound. This workshop provides the basic elements to achieve this success.

### Integrating Motivational Interviewing as a Skill Set for Wraparound Facilitators

John Mayo, Success 4 Kids & Families St. Thomas/St. Croix Room

Introduction into the basics of Motivational Interviewing (MI) as a skill set for beginning Wraparound Facilitators. Common values and principles between Wraparound and MI will be discussed, along with an introduction into the basic process and skills of MI. The Stages of Change will also be discussed in regards to the four phases of Wraparound. As the Why Wheel is a flexible tool, it has broad applicability, and providers can update it regularly to reflect and address clients' changing needs - and the factors impacting those needs - from intake through discharge.
